

Founded by John Deaton and Michael Lysaght in 1993, Deaton Lysaght is celebrating its 15th year in business this year. The firm recently completed the iconic Joe Daly retail and office building at the Luas bridge in Dundrum, a very demanding project aesthetically because of the sensitive location beside the Luas bridge and technically due to the form of the building and its very restricted site at the river's edge. Deaton Lysaght is a "grade one" RIAI accredited conservation practice. The practice has extended and adapted a large number of courthouses to meet the Courts Service's requirements for a modern court system including County Courthouses at Longford, Carlow, Naas and the awardwinning Clonmel Courthouse. The extension and refurbishment of Thurles Courthouse and Clasach Arts Centre in Clontarf (Plan Magazine Nov 2008) are also just completed.
